What does the Graduate Teaching Assistants' Representative do?

The Graduate Teaching Assistant Rep is the main representative of GTAs both within the Students' Union and LSE as a whole, a group that is often under-represented within both institutions.

Your work will be centred on improving GTA conditions. You will work closely with the Education Officer and the PHD Officer. You will have the chance to put on events for your constituency throughout the year to improve the provision of services for GTAs in the LSE.

What you will do in the role

- Attend all 6 Academic Board meetings during the academic year and represent the views of all GTAs at these meetings.
- Prepare for the meetings by coming to briefing sessions put on by the SU, reading the relevant reports and papers and consulting with GTAs on the issues they care about.
- Following up by helping LSE implement change and reporting back to GTAs.

What is the Academic Board?

The Academic Board is the principal academic body of LSE, and all major policy issues affecting the academic life of the School and its students go through here. It is chaired by the Director of LSE, and all academic staff such as professors and teaching fellows can attend.

Over the last couple of years the Academic Board has discussed the LSE Education Strategy, which will shape the direction of education at LSE over the next five years, as well as issues surrounding study space, plagiarism, department structure and free speech at LSE. There is also the opportunity for members of the board to ask questions on school policy to senior figures within the school.

You should nominate yourself if...

- You are passionate about improving the academic experience for GTAs at LSE.
- You see changes you want to make in GTA conditions, and you want the opportunity to speak to the highest levels of LSE to make that change.
- You want a flexible leadership role that you can fit around your studies, work and other commitments.
- You want to develop you communication and organisational skills, and improve your CV.
