What is the Court of Governors?

The Court of Governors is one of the highest decision-making bodies at LSE, second only to the Council in its scope and authority. The court discusses all key issues relating to school policy, as well as dealing with constitutional matters as and when they arise.

Over the past couple of years the Court of Governors has discussed a variety of issues crucial to school policy, including student fees halls rent and investment in education.

What you will do in the role

- Attend all 3 Court of Governors meetings during the academic year and represent the views of all students at these meetings.
- Prepare for the meetings by coming to briefing sessions put on by the SU, reading the relevant reports and papers and consulting with students on the issues they care about.
- Following up by helping LSE implement change and reporting back to students.

You should nominate yourself if...

- You are passionate about improving life at LSE for all students.
- You see changes you want to make at the institution, and you want the opportunity to influence the highest levels of LSE to make that change.
- You want a flexible leadership role that you can fit around your studies and other commitments.
- You want to develop your communication and lobbying skills, and improve your CV.
